The project provided a 2208m² floor extension to the rear/west of the existing Dunfermline Carnegie Library. The extension is housed behind the retained façade of the former commercial bank at 5-7 Abbot Street and incorporates refurbishment works within the existing library.

The extension incorporates display areas and exhibition spaces together with modern learning/study facilities.

In addition to the above a café has been provided offering panoramic views over the landscaped gardens and Dunfermline Abbey.

The outdoor landscaped areas for visitors will also provide a facility for open-air performances.

## **Project information**

A new extension at the rear of a retained listed façade providing museum and gallery space together with refurbishment work to the existing library.

The new extension comprised a reinforced concrete structure on large diameter bored concrete piled foundations. The extension is clad in a variety of high quality materials including 'Corten' steel panels, natural stone, timber and extensive glazed areas.

The public spaces are arranged over four levels including two mezzanines and linked via stairways and feature walkways.

Internally, finishes are of the highest quality with natural timber used extensively throughout.

A café has been provided in addition to the learning and display areas with exhibition space provided within three flexible galleries.

The facility has been provided within the heart of Dunfermline with panoramic views of the historic Abbey. Landscaped gardens, which incorporate historic statues and seating areas, provide an attractive space for visitors and the people of Dunfermline.

It was the RIAS 2017 winner in the Sports/Leisure/Culture category.

The project won the prestigious RIAS Andrew Doolan Best Building in Scotland Award for 2017.
